### Community

Rancho San Juan High School is one of five public high schools in the Salinas Union High School District. Rancho San Juan is located in Salinas, CA, which is a rural town with a population of 162,791 residents (2021 census.gov).

### School Description

Rancho San Juan High School has a current enrollment of 1,734 students. The approximate counselor to student ratio for 2022-2023 is 1:350. The school operates on a block schedule divided into two (2), eighteen (18) week semesters with two (2) reporting periods each semester.\*\* Rancho San Juan has an extensive and varied college preparatory program, including a wide range of Advanced Placement and honors courses. Four (4) programs on campus are focused on helping first-generation students successfully prepare to attain a four-year college education: AVID, PUENTE, Migrant Education, and Upward Bound.

### Accreditation

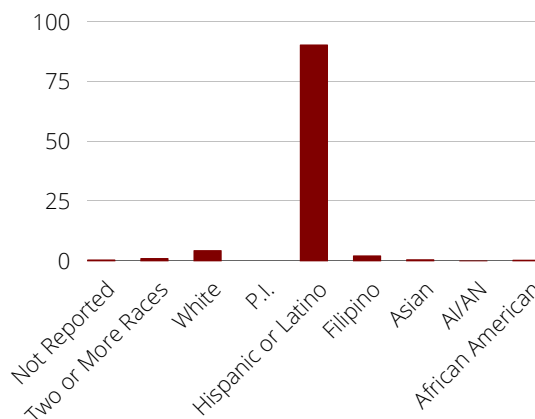
Rancho San Juan High School, established in 2019 is a comprehensive four-year public high school and is accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges. 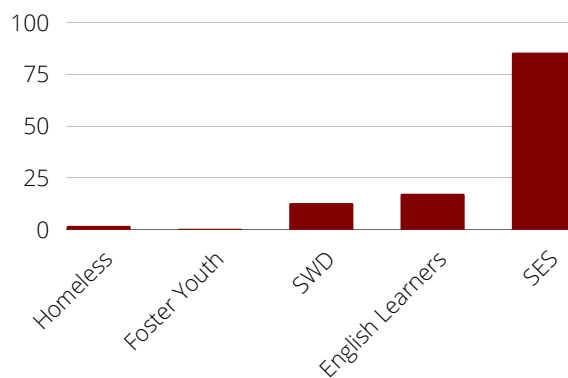
### 2021–22 Enrollment By Ethnicity

### Graduation Requirements

- Students must earn 220 credits to graduate,
  - five credits per semester for courses completed with a grade of "D" or better are awarded.
- Minimum GPA required is 2.0.
- Minimum of 85% yearly attendance.
- \*60 hours of community service required for class of 2023
  - (\*Waived for the Class of 2023) 40 hours of community service are required for graduating classes of 2024 and beyond.

## Grade Point Average (GPA)

GPA is based on a 4.0 scale. Three GPAs appear on Rancho San Juan transcripts:

1. Overall GPA is unweighted and includes all coursework completed in grades 9-12
2. UC/CSU A-G Weighted GPA includes a-g coursework completed in grades 10-12; honors and AP courses receive an extra grade point and have a designation on the transcript as H or AP.
3. State GPA is unweighted and includes academic coursework completed in grades 10-12, excluding PE.

**\*\*Class rank** is based on cumulative weighted GPA and is listed on transcript.

## Dual Enrollment

Dual Enrollment is offered through Hartnell College as of Fall 2020 at Rancho San Juan's campus for students who wish to earn high school credits while also earning transferable community college credits.

## Academic Programs



The Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID) Program is a nationally recognized program that prepares students, who are academically in the middle, for four-year college eligibility. Focus major components: Student skills for lifelong learning and academic instruction. The mission of is to close the achievement gap by preparing all students for college readiness and success in a global society. The Rancho San Juan AVID student also completes the A-G requirements and is accepted to UC and CSU schools at rates higher than the state average.



English Language Learner (ELL) Program: ELLs are taught academic content in English by content licensed teachers. The English language used for instruction is adapted to the proficiency level of the students.



The Puente Project is an inter-segmental program that is co-sponsored by the University of California and the California Community College Chancellor's Office. It provides college preparatory English classes in 9th and 10th grade, where students participate in standards aligned with the language arts curriculum as well as a culturally inclusive curriculum that accelerates students' growth and literacy, and prepares them for college-level reading and writing. Students work closely with a Puente counselor to prepare and adhere to an academic plan focused on college readiness. Puente is open to all students and is designed to meet the needs of students from populations with low rates of enrollment at four year colleges.
